on **Ohio House Bill 283**, also known as the "distracted driving" bill. Bob described the latest amendment to the bill which is a "carve out" for Amateur Radio. We urge you to contact your local representative and ask that the bill along with the amendment be passed.

For the October meeting we will be at Houlihan's in Westlake. We expect to have Zoom call-in available. At \$30 per person, the cost is somewhat higher than what we are used to paying. But, keep in mind that includes beverage, tax, and gratuity and factors in the restaurant allowing us to use the room for 3+ hours. For more on that topic, see the section on "Future Meetings" further on in this article.

Our speaker for the October Meeting will be **Anthony Luscre**, **K8ZT**. If that name sounds familiar, he's presented at LEARA meetings twice before, and he's also the ARRL Ohio Section Youth Coordinator. His topic will be "**Portable Operations**". He will be presenting tips and tricks on how to set yourself up for portable operating, like camping, Parks on the Air, or even Field Day. Pretty much anyplace where there isn't a permanent antenna installation, or the availability of commercial power.

Please share the meeting info on any nets you might be on, with other Ham Radio clubs, and with anyone who you think might be interested in this event. Attendees DO NOT need to be members of LEARA or even Hams.

Future Meetings: As I mentioned in last month's column, most of the restaurants where we previously held meetings are not booking their banquet or meeting rooms at this time. **Eddie Stevens, KD8FTS**, has been checking back with restaurants we've previously met at and also checking out newly suggested venues.

A trend that has become very apparent is that prices of food in general and restaurants in particular have risen sharply since the beginning of this year. When I first saw the proposed price for Houlihan's, my first thought was somewhere between, "Hell, No!" and the less polite version of, "What the Heck?" Then, besides consulting my fellow trustees, I looked up Houlihan's menu online. I found that to order similar entrées with everything that's included one could easily be in the \$25-\$30 range by the time they got out the door.

For the November Holiday meeting, we are looking at the **Hofbräuhaus** at about \$45 per person and ordering from a selection of four entrées. That price will include beverage, dessert, tax, and gratuity.

The last time that LEARA was at the Hofbräuhaus was November 2019. I was not able to attend that time. The time before that was May 2018. That was 3½ years ago. At that time we ordered off the menu and the bill for me and Sara, KC8KSU, with everything included came to around \$65. And, we did not have dessert which is included in the current proposal. The Hofbräuhaus is definitely a more expensive venue and not one that I would suggest for regular meetings, but I think still doable for a once a year holiday gathering. Let us know what you think.

Going forward into next year, one option is to simply stay with My Friends Restaurant and possibly alternate with Kumo Seafood Buffet. Our last meeting at My Friends was in August of this year and was not well attended, although on previous occasions (pre-COVID 19) we filled the room. I'm not sure if the poor attendance was due to COVID 19 concerns, the location, or something else, especially since the September meeting at Kumo was well attended. Personally, I would like to see us rotate among three restaurants, perhaps My Friends, Kumo, and the Firehouse Grille and Pub in Willoughby Hills when they reopen for groups.

So, the Trustees and I need to hear from YOU! If you have been coming to meetings, what would you like to see us do to keep you attending? If you haven't been coming to meetings, what are your concerns? What would it take to get you to attend?

The next **Trustees meeting** will be Saturday, November 13 at 9:15 AM via **Zoom**. All LEARA members are welcome to attend. It has been brought to my attention that some members may be put off by having to request the link for the Trustees meetings. Therefore, I will be emailing the link to all members on the Wednesday or Thursday prior to the meeting. If you don't get it, please contact us. Thanks to the **Hamfest Association of Cleveland (HAC.org)** for the use of the Zoom video conferencing.

Elections: October is the month when LEARA has its annual business meeting and conducts the election of Trustees for the following year. However, the Bylaws state that when the number of candidates is equal to or less than the number of positions open the election will not be held. Current Trustee Steve Spisak, K8SAS, has declined to run for reelection. Dave Andrzejewski, AD8G, Radio Officer and former trustee has stepped up and is running for Trustee. That with the incumbents, Marv Grossman, W8AZO, and me means we have three candidates running for three offices. Therefore the new and renewed Trustees will be seated at the November Trustees meeting. Club officers will also be chosen from among the Trustees at the November Trustees meeting.

I had at least three other topics I wanted to talk about, but I'm out of space and time.

Until next month, talk on the radio and use the repeaters. Check into one of the many nets available on the LEARA repeaters. Join us on the air, online, or in person. If you don't feel safe meeting in person due to the pandemic, we understand. But, we really want to see or at least hear from you, even if it is only by Radio or Zoom.



Good day, all

I've recently returned to Northeast Ohio (temporarily) and was curious what 22 years has done to the local Amateur Radio community. It's not pretty. My time down the shoreline in Vermilion was the big slowdown. Those among us who saw Amateur Radio as primarily a tool fell away as the 'cell phone of the year club' replaced the 'radio of the month club.' Those among us who thought of Amateur Radio more as a fraternity likely found this as unsettling as I did. Time marches on.

The Texas era brought a very active Amateur Radio scene, both in San Antonio and Galveston. The people there were friendly, and any hint of the severe weather brought everyone out repeaters, simplex, HF. Short jaunts to the Atlanta suburbs brought more of the same, Little Rock as well.

Returning to Northeast Ohio was a bit of ice water down the back. Most of the repeaters are still in operation,

including a large handful of wide area machines. A 70cm repeater is the single machine to get regular use anymore. LEARAs repeaters are all quite high profile, and ghostly silent. Plenty of members, who don't QSO anymore, or perhaps they find HF to exclusively satisfy their needs/wants. I can't speak for them.

My favourite LEARA repeater tale took place on 9-11-2001. As was the routine, I had a regular schedule with a relative over the 224.900 repeater. 11am til 11:25ish. The QSO went something like this:

She-ham: I was so tired this morning, I just got up from a nap

Me-ham: You haven't turned the TV on yet???

She-ham: No, I told you I just woke up. Me-ham: TURN ON THE TELEVISION

She-ham: Why? What's going on?

Me-ham: TURN **ON** THE TELEVISION!!!

She ham: Ok, it's on channel 5. WHATS GOING ON?

Me-ham: Sign clear and get caught up. I'll be home a little early today.

She-ham signs clear, and I remain informed via my text pager that had 2 separate news feeds. The constant vibration in my pocket that day would always signal an interesting update, and my co-workers would cluster around to read the news texts.

The Northeast Blackout of August 2003 brought a particularly interesting QSO as well.

Me-ham: (224.900 again) N8QMK, listening. Listening for news of the situation.

WA8ZHN: I'm just trying HF into New York State, stand-by

A few moments later: Niagara Falls and (Albany, I think) are both without power as well.

I thanked Jim for sharing that information and proceeded to lug the 2500 watt generator out of the garage and onto the gravel pad that usually had a charcoal grill on it. My point is that thanks to Amateur Radio, (within 45 minutes of losing power,) via both HF and LEARA repeater, Jim and I were quite aware of the gravity of the situation, something that WTAM took 5 hours to figure out.

In closing, I'd like to ask all who are reading to get back on the local airwaves, give '76 and '88 some well-deserved attention. 224.900 needs attention desperately as well. If we all throw our call signs out and make 2 QSOs a day, that's 3 local repeaters that won't just fade away. This is a big deal. This is important. LEARA machines all need exercise, badly.

Students at UK School for Deaf Youngsters Enjoy Space Chat

Students at the Mary Hare School for deaf children in the UK took part in what appears to have been a world-first event for Amateur Radio on the International Space Station (ARISS). Facilitating the late-morning direct contact with astronaut Mark Vande Hei, KG5GNP, at NA1SS were ARISS-UK and members of the Newbury and District Amateur Radio Society (NADARS). The ground station used the call sign GB4MHN. ARISS-UK volunteers handled the technical aspects, while NADARS members provided students with the "amateur radio experience" through events and activities.

Students asked their questions orally, and the astronaut's replies — as well as questions and answers posed by the audience before the contact began — were displayed in closed caption format beneath a huge video screen.

The Mary Hare School is an aural school for the deaf that teaches students to develop lip-reading

skills and to make use of technology. Students range in age from 5 through 19 years old. An enthusiastic audience of some 250 individuals was in the auditorium, where the contact took place, while another 600 students at other locations in the school observed the contact via a web feed.

Leading up to the contact, students at the school learned about radio- and space-related topics that touched on physics, chemistry, and biology. Student activities have included designing and flying model rockets, making astronomical observations, and observing authentic spacesuits.

Students wanted to know if the astronauts used sign language in space in case something goes wrong, how the ISS would be evacuated in the event of a fire, and whether mobile devices such as cell phones work in space.

"You made my day!" Vande Hei said after all the questions had been asked and the students had applauded.

A livestream was available and has been archived.

Amateur radio equipment has been on board the ISS for more than 20 years, and most astronauts hold ham radio licenses. A live web feed will be available.
